Old and New- mixture of architecture

Classic or old architecture has its own value.


The nice mixture of architecture is an idendity of copenhagen. The way/method to comebine/reuse old architecture is an art.



Land Use- Single use/ Mix use


If the whole area is designed for only one single use, the area is easy to be dead/closed. During the regular working time, it will be empty.

If the area is a mix used, it will be active/alive. And more secure.




The Edge- the connection between spaces

The connection between spaces is usually a key that decides the site's future. If the edge is hard or close, the area will not be coherrent. The Potato houses community in Copenhagen is a nice example of a no-edge design.




Avoid Monotony- (functional and visual)

You might want to design things with multiple purpose/function. The canel in Oresta is a failure example (it only has one function- decoration). This sometimes results in high-maintenance. This can apply to landscape elements too.



Pattern behind patterns- social structure

Scandinavia has different tax structure. People are paying almost half of their income to their government. However, government spends money on planners, designers, and the space. It makes users feel the aesthetic details, and the coherence from planning.



= Less can be more

Sometimes a place does not need a luxery design, nor a rich mix of elements. The designer of Helsingbor beach uses a single element(wood) to serve as a foil of the beautiful color of water. It can be active, but simple.



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
