# **Project 02: Design Precedent Studies**

DUE: Presentation: Wednesday, 12 October
Poster, 2 copies report for booklet, and digital copy on U-drive: Friday 14 October

Good design is often informed and inspired by precedent studies of previously designed projects. For this assignment, you will work in pairs (preferably with someone from another discipline), and you will select a **precedent site** to research and present to the rest of the group. A list of potential places is on the back (or propose one of your own). Some of these sites you may have visited; for others your research will be primarily through websites, articles, books and interviews.

You will prepare documentation of the precedent study using a standard InDesign template that we will give you. The template will include space for:

- Narrative descriptions of the site, the planning approach, design features, and implementation. Include connective features between city, waterfront and water, waterfront edge treatment, public spaces and uses, habitat provision and if/how the design addresses future sea level rise.
- Photos, diagrams, quotes, sketches, etc.
- Your evaluation of the success of the space, or critique by others. Consider how the site works for a variety of users, different seasons and times of the day and night. What lessons does it provide for our design project?
- Designers and clients for the project
- The list of resources that you used. Be sure to credit images and sources of quotes.
- **Poster at 11 x 17" with essential images and information.** The poster can be an enlargement of the first page of the narrative report, or can include additional information from the report.

You will present your study to the class on Wednesday, 12 October, showing the document pages digitally.

Due Friday I4, October: Poster II x I7 hung on designated wall, 2 hard copies narrative report submitted to instructors, and digital version loaded onto the U-drive.

You might find it useful to look at past precedent studies, including those for urban waterfronts. Some case studies may already exist which require upgrading, and you are welcome to work on those (some are included below). Past studies are on the course website, with hard copies in the Case Study binder.
